
ESSENTIAL SKILLS FOR SUCCESS In the Modern Job Market

Career Talk Event

On July 28th, 2021, the Office of Career Services & Alumni Relations organized a career talk for university students themed, Incorporating Soft Skills to Develop Professionalism and Career Development. The keynote speaker was Sharon Mbugua, Managing Director of Amethyst Consulting.

The activities of the day included:

- i. Definition and types of careers
- ii. Entering the job market through -
- Job identification: The speaker enlightened the students about Job advert information sources, such as; LinkedIn, recruiting firms, referrals, etc., how to apply for jobs, identifying jobs not necessarily in one's field, etc.
- Job application: Employers usually have uniform job application forms that job seekers are required to fill out. These forms are often completed online, but some organizations still use paper applications. Employers use uniform job application forms because they can easily compare each applicant's background and work experience. Job applications require preparation at an individual level and through the formal application procedure. CVs also need to stand out to attract Human Resources. The speaker also mentioned the need to remodel CVs to suit the job opportunity you are applying for.
- Shortlisting: The speaker advanced that shortlisting is the process of identifying the candidates from an applicant pool who best meet the desired criteria. Recruiters have varied processes of shortlisting. In many instances, shortlisting is usually an overwhelming process due to the vast number of applications. The speaker stated that instead of poring over hundreds of applications to get to the select few who might be a fit, you can focus on the best available talent from the start.
- **Interviewing:** Interviews provide an opportunity for both the potential employer and employee to decide if the individuals skills and character align with the firms needs and culture.
- **Recruiting:** Recruiting a suitable candidate is vital to the success of the company. Preparation is crucial, and so is an unbiased comparison of candidates. It would be best to prepare a set of standard must-have questions, read through the resume thoroughly, and note down additional questions for every individual. Effective recruitment means more than hiring the right person for the job. A fast and efficient

recruitment process can **reduce costs**, enhance a company's reputation both from a market and candidate perspective and ensure that the very best talent is identified, engaged, and hired.

• **Onboarding:** The speaker explained that onboarding is the action or process of inducting a new employee into an organization. It typically involves taking the necessary steps to ensure that new hires are welcomed into their new role, have a thorough understanding of the company and its mission, and have clear expectations of their role's responsibilities.

iii. Group exercise on MOCK interview simulation

The speaker divided the students into groups of six and chose one student from each group to be interviewed by their group members. The students learned how an interview is done and how important it is to answer questions correctly to ensure you get the job.

iv. Career Assessment and its importance The speaker mentioned that career assessment helps one know their interests, personality, aptitudes, skills, values and strengths.

v. Expectations from career choices selected

The students were taught to seek alignment with their interests. They should work towards job satisfaction.

vi. The Future of Work

Soft skills and emotional intelligence is vital in the workplace. The speaker mentioned that Emotional intelligence (otherwise known as emotional quotient or EQ) is the ability to understand, use, and manage your own emotions in positive ways to relieve stress, communicate effectively, empathize with others, overcome challenges and defuse conflict. Emotional intelligence helps you build stronger relationships, succeed at school and work, and achieve your career and personal goals. It can also help you connect with your feelings, turn intention into action, and make informed decisions about what matters most to you.

In Conclusion, the speaker introduced students to the realities of the job environment after graduation. The key among issues was that after graduating, one enters the job environment at the bottom level. Those in managerial positions look for job seekers who are relevant and visionary. Additionally, graduates need to adjust to the fact that getting a job unrelated to their career path is high, mainly because opportunities in Kenya are limited. Still, in case that happens, one should embrace the opportunity and grow in it. The speaker reminded the students that the job market is crowded and competitive and therefore, those who manage to survive are the ones who can take additional roles and give their best.



Tugha hii kuziendeshaa shughuli zao za kila siku. Nchini Kenya, Kiswahili kimepewa hadhi ya lugha ya taifa na lugha rasmi. Hivyo basi, Kiswahili ni kiungo muhimu katika kujenga na kuendeleza umoja katika taifa hili. Uzungumzwaji wake umechangia pakubwa katika kuziporomosha kuta za ukabila na kujenga utangamano mwema miongoni mwa Wakenya. Vilevile, Kiswahili ni kitambulisho muhimu cha kitaifa na wanaokizungumza hudhihirisha uzalendo wao kwa nchi hii.

Kwa kuwa Kiswahili ni lugha muhimu kwetu, ni vyema kwa kila Mkenya kufanya juhudi awezazo kukikuza. Tunatambua hatua muhimu ambazo zimepigwa na wataalamu wa lugha, wanaisimu, wanahabari, vyombo vya habari na hata serikali katika kukikuza Kiswahili nchini. Ufundishaji wa lugha ya Kiswahili wa wanafunzi wote haupaswi kutamatika katika shule za upili bali uendelezwe katika taasisi za elimu ya juu.

Hata hivyo, kuna wale ambao huwa tayari wamo katika mahusiano ya kimapenzi wanapoingia katika chuo kikuu.



Tutumie Kiswahili Kama Chombo Cha Kuwaunganisha Wanafunzi Vyuoni

Ara nyingi tumeiona lugha ya Kiswahili kama lugha ya kujua kuizungumza na kuiandika tu, na labda lugha ya kufunzia katika shule na vyuo vikuu. Ukweli ni kwamba umuhimu wa Kiswahili unapita mipaka hii. Lugha hii ni nyenzo inayoweza kutumiwa kutekelezwa majukumu mengi katika jamii. Rais wa kwanza wa taifa la Afrika Kusini, marehemu Nelson Mandela, aliwahi kusema kuwa ukimzungumzia mtu kwa lugha anayoijua, hayo huenda akilini, lakini ukimzngumzia kwa lugha yake, hayo yanapokelewa moyoni.

Katika tahariri hii, tunaangazia jinsi tunavyoweza kutumia Kiswahili kama nyenzo ya kuleta umoja miongoni mwa wanafunzi wa vyuo vikuu. Vyou vikuu nchini huwa na wanafunzi wanaotoka katika maeneo mbalimbali nchini na katika Jumuiya ya Afrika Mashariki. Wanafunzi husika wanatofautiana katika maswala kama makabila, matabaka, dini, miegemeo ya kisiasa. Tofauti hizi zinaweza kuhitilafisha mahusiano miongoni mwa wanafunzi wa vyuo vikuu. Hata hivyo, lugha ya Kiswahili kinaweza kutumika kama chombo muhimu cha kuwaunganisha wanafunzi hao.

Wanafunzi wa vyuo vikuu wanaweza kutumia Kiswahili kama chombo muhimu cha mawasiliano yao wakiwa chuoni. Kuzungumza Kiswahili kunayeyusha kuta zinazowatenga wanafunzi na kuchangia katika kujenga jamii moja ya wanafunzi katika chuo kikuu husika. Wanafunzi wanapokutana kupiga gumzo pamoja wakati ambapo hawana vipindi au wanapoyazungumzia hali zinazowakumba chuoni, wanaweza kufanya hivyo kwa Kiswahili. Wanafunzi wa vyuo vikuu, vilevile, hutumia Kiswahili kuwasiliana wakati wanapokutana katika Nyanja mbalimbali za michezo na hata katika tamasha za talanta chuoni. Hali hii inachangia kukuza na kuendeleza uzalendo wa wanafunzi hao kwa taifa la Kenya na hivyo kujiepesha na migawanyiko ya kikabila. Kweli, uzi hupitia palipopitia sindano na palipo nia pana njia. 
